

# TEACHINGS FROM REVEREND Grateful Opportunity Reverend Shinkai Murakami

As you may know, great athletes captivate us with their remarkable skills and performances. Whether it's the NBA Finals, the World Series, or the NFL Super Bowl, these events are thrilling, and we passionately support our favorite teams with cheers like "Go, Go, Go" and "Defense, Defense." In each winning team, there is often a "Hero," the MVP, who plays a pivotal role in securing victory. Yet, behind every MVP, there are countless individuals working diligently behind the scenes, whose support is crucial to the team's success, even though they may not receive the spotlight or awards.

The Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii is preparing to celebrate a significant milestone with a triple celebration on September 7 and 8 at the Ala Moana Hotel. This momentous event will mark the 135th anniversary of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, the 800th anniversary of hte establishment of Hongwanji, and the 850th birthday of Shintani Shonin. We anticipate the participation of ministers from across the state, their families, temple presidents, and our sangha. The celebration will include educational workshops on both days and culminate in a special service with rituals reminiscent of those at our Mother Temple in Kyoto. It is a once-in-alifetime experience and serves as a poignant reminder of the causes and conditions that have shaped our ministries here in Hawaii. The 135-year history of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii stands as a testament to the strength of our community. We take pride in the work we have done together with our members, sangha, and the wider community, and we have truly become a united Ohana.

As members of Hongwanji, whether minister, temple member, or BWA member, we are all guided by the Nembutsu and have the opportunity to share this profound guidance with our community daily. In the Homages, it is said, "Hard it is to be born into human life; now we are living in it. Difficult it is to hear the Teachings of the Blessed One; now we hear them." This reminds us to appreciate all we have and to find joy in the happiness of others. The Buddha's teachings remind us, "Your happiness is my happiness, and your sadness is my sadness, too."



# Buddha Reads: In Cold Blood Danny Topp




The Buddha Reads book club recently explored Truman Capote's "In Cold Blood," a pioneering work in the true crime genre. This non-fiction novel details the chilling 1959 murders of the Clutter family in the small farming town of Holcomb, Kansas, and delves into the lives of the victims, the investigation, and the eventual capture, trial, and execution of the killers, Richard "Dick" Hickock and Perry Smith.

The narrative opens with a vivid portrayal of the Clutter family: Herb Clutter, a respected farmer; his wife Bonnie; and their teenage children, Nancy and Kenyon. Their serene existence is violently disrupted when Hickock and Smith, recently released from prison, break into their home in search of a rumored safe. Finding nothing of value, the intruders decide to murder the family to eliminate witnesses.


In a recent Zoom meeting, club members Bob, Joan, Gary, and Danny discussed their perspectives on this seminal work. Joan, who had never read the book before, found it deeply engaging. Bob and Danny, having read it previously, appreciated discovering new insights during their second read. Bob questioned Capote's motives for writing the book, noting that Capote began working on it shortly after the murders, initially as a series for "The New Yorker." Bob also critiqued the book's lengthy side stories as somewhat distracting. Gary, a true crime aficionado, sought additional context online and observed that Capote's portraval of the murderers was somewhat sympathetic, particularly towards Smith.

Overall, the group found "In Cold Blood" a compelling read and recommended it to others.

Looking ahead, the Buddha Reads book club will discuss Julie Otsuka's "The Buddha in the Attic," a short novel, on Sunday, August 25th. Upcoming selections include Hermann Hesse's "Siddhartha" and David Guterson's "Snow Falling on Cedars." All members and interested readers are encouraged to join the discussions and share their thoughts.

#### **Mandarin Orange Pie**

Crust: \*\*This crust recipe will make enough for two 9x13 inch pans\*\*

One 14oz box of graham crackers - pulse the whole box in the food processor to crumbs. 8-12oz melted unsalted butter (Amount varies 3oz sugar 2oz AP flour (unsifted)

Combine dry ingredients in a large bowl. Add enough melted butter to create a "wet sand" crumbly mix; test mixture by squeezing a handful of crumb, if the mixture holds its shape when you open your hand then you have used enough butter and you are ready to go. If the mixture crumbles or cracks apart then add a little more butter. Press half of the mix into the bottom of a 9X13 inch pan. Press the mix firmly, should not be loose.

Bake crust @ 350 degrees for 12-15 minutes (until edges are toasty and the middle is golden brown). Over baking will make the crust hard and bitter



#### Filling:

2 small cans mandarin oranges, drained, saving 3/4 c. of juice 1Tbsp sugar 18 oz sour cream Two 3.4 oz boxes of instant vanilla pudding

### **Topping:**1 large Cool Whip

Whisk together mandarin orange juice, sugar, sour cream, and pudding. Fold in mandarin oranges. Pour on cooled crust. Spread whipped cream over the entire surface. Refrigerate.
