This past September, the Honpa Hong-wanji Mission of Hawaii celebrated three significant anniversaries: Shinran Shonin's 850th birth anniversary, the 800th anniversary of Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji's establishment, and our own Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii's 135th anniversary. Our Wailuku Hongwanji Mission's 125th anniversary adds to these grand occasions, making this year truly special. During World War II, our temple faced a significant challenge when the US military sought to condemn our facility. After the war, many individuals, including ministers released from concentration camps, returned to the temple. Some cried, others felt deep appreciation, and many found peace and serenity through the Nembutsu. These shared experiences and our unity as a community make our temple truly special and significant in our lives.

Though time has passed and those dedicated members have returned to Amida's Pure Land, they left us invaluable treasures. Our beautiful temple, our programs, and our services reflect the legacy of those who came before us. As a resident minister of this temple

for over 20 years, I deeply value the treasures inherited from our predecessors and cherish the continued growth of our community.

Wailuku Hongwanji Mission is indeed a great Dharma Castle, a place where we can share our values, smiles, joy, and gratitude with our Ohana. We welcome new friends seeking spiritual guidance, as we are all fellow Nembutsu travelers on this journey. Please remember that the County of Maui has proclaimed the third Sunday of October as "Wailuku Hongwanji Day."

A true community is illuminated by faith and wisdom. It is a place where people know and trust one another, and there is social harmony. Harmony is the essence of a true community."

Wailuku Hongwanji Mission serves our community, and we are always working together and participating in our Ohana. With sincere gratitude and joy, let us celebrate our 125th anniversary on October 20, 2024.

Flowing Fun: Gakuen's Somen Adventure

On August 28, Gakuen students kicked off their first fall activity with the fun and flavorful tradition of "Somen Nagashi," (素類流し) while honing their hashi (chopstick) skills.

Somen, a thin Japanese wheat noodle, is a refreshing summer dish in Japan. After briefly boiling the noodles, they are chilled in icy water and served with mentsuyu, a dipping sauce made from soy sauce, mirin, and dashi. Known for its light texture and taste, somen is typically garnished with negi (green onions) and nori (seaweed). The dish is popular as a low-calorie meal during Japan's hot summers.

What made this event even more exciting was the somen nagashi experience, where noodles flow down a "waterslide." Students lined up, chopsticks in hand, ready to catch the slippery noodles as they streamed by in the cold water. The challenge of grabbing somen on the move led to plenty of laughter and excitement as students hurried to snatch their noodles before they disappeared down the slide.

Somen nagashi is not just a fun eating experience; it's a beloved group activity in Japan, often featured at summer events. This interactive and engaging experience was the perfect way for Gakuen students to bond, laugh, and practice their chopstick skills in a fun, hands-on way.

While students are focused on learning the Japanese language, more exciting cultural activities are planned throughout the semester. In October, Gakuen will host a Spam musubi-making day, giving students another opportunity to create, enjoy, and share in the fun of preparing this local favorite.









1 box Yellow cake mix 2 tsp. Baking powder ½ tsp. Baking soda ¾ Wesson cup oil 1 ½ cup mashed bananas 3 eggs 1 tsp. Vanilla

Sift together cake mix, baking soda and baking powder. Set aside

Mix together rest of ingredients. Add to dry ingredients and blend well.

Bake at 325 degrees for 30 minutes in 13x9 pan which is lightly greased. Check if done by inserting toothpick on cake – toothpick should come out clean.

When still hot, poke holes (with toothpick) on cake and pour over a mixture of 1/8 cup milk and 1/2 tsp. sugar.



In the words of the Buddha, "Happiness does not depend on what you have or who you are. It solely relies on what you think."




Events like these are a testament to the positive impact of collective effort and the joy that comes from engaging with others in meaningful ways.



Buddha Reads: The Buddha in the Attic

On August 25, the book discussion group—consisting of Bob, Danny, Joan, and Gary—gathered via Zoom to explore Julie Otsuka's novel, *The Buddha in the Attic*. This lyrical work delves into the lives of Japanese "picture brides" who immigrated to the United States in the early 20th century, capturing their collective and individual experiences through a unique narrative style.

The Buddha in the Attic is crafted in a collective first-person voice, which aims to highlight the shared experiences and strug-

gles of these women. The novel begins with their hopeful journey across the ocean, arriving in America to meet husbands seen only in photographs. Upon arrival, these women confront the harsh realities of new lives, facing unmet expectations and enduring the trials of work, racism, and exploitation.

Despite the novel's significant subject matter and its unique narrative approach, the group's consensus was less than favorable. Bob expressed a strong opinion against the book, feeling it fell short in depicting the picture brides' experiences and would not recommend it. Gary, Joan, and Danny also shared reservations, noting the absence of a traditional plot and main character, which left the group disengaged.

However, the discussion highlighted some valuable insights. The group appreciated learning about the diverse backgrounds of the picture brides, which contradicted the initial assumption of a homogeneous group. Additionally, Otsuka's use of an "incantatory" style—intended to evoke a hypnotic or dreamlike quality—was noted as an interesting stylistic choice.

The novel also explores the women's struggles with adapting to American society, raising children, and maintaining cultural identity. In its final sections, it addresses the impact of World War II on the Japanese American community, including the forced relocation to internment camps.

Looking ahead, the group is preparing to delve into *Siddhartha* by Hermann Hesse. The next meeting is scheduled for September 15th, where this classic work will be discussed.

Cyber Crime Activity Alert

Important Security Notice: Beware of Recent Phishing Emails!

We want to alert our community to another recent phishing attempt targeting our temple. Some members have received fraudulent emails that appear to come from Rev. Murakami but are actually sent from the email address rev.reverend@keemail.me. These emails request gift cards or money and will typically start by instructing you not to call Rev. Murakami and to work solely through email, claiming it is an urgent and confidential matter—such as surprising temple members with a gift.

It's important to note that Rev. Murakami's official email has not been compromised. The fraudulent emails are coming from a different address, likely created by scammers using the reverend's name because he is a public figure. This tactic is intended to exploit the trust and generosity of our community, especially given the heightened demands on Maui due to our disaster area status.

Please remember that Rev. Murakami will never ask for gift cards or any form of reimbursement via email. If you receive such an email, do not respond or click on any links, as these may compromise your computer's security. First, call the temple directly to verify the email's authenticity.

After verification, it is crucial to file a report with the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) at IC3.gov. Reporting is easy and important; provide as much information as possible. The FBI relies on these reports to identify patterns and build cases against the perpetrators, who often target elderly individuals. Cyber crimes involving people over 60 can result in higher penalties, making timely reporting essential.

By staying vigilant and reporting suspicious emails, we help protect our community and support efforts to combat cyber crime.
