

TEACHINGS FROM THE MINISTER

Honpa Hongwanji Legislative Assembly

The Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii will hold its annual Legislative Assembly (Giseikai) this February at the Hawaii Betsuin Social Hall. This gathering brings together Hongwanji members, district directors, and ministers from across the state to discuss and vote on key resolutions over two days. As one of our most important meetings, the assembly is conducted according to Hongwanji's bylaws, reflecting our shared commitment to the Nembutsu tradition and its values.

This year marks the 113th Giseikai since the establishment of Hawaii Kyodan in 1889. While we don't have records of the first assembly or the resolutions discussed back then, it's clear that our predecessors valued a democratic process in their meetings, which remains a cornerstone of our organization today. Over the decades, the topics have evolved from internal programs and issues to include broader social concerns, reflecting the Hongwanji Mission's integral role in our communities.

As I participate in my 40th Giseikai this year, I feel deeply honored to be part of this enduring legacy. I am grateful for the dedication and sacrifices of the Nembutsu pioneers who built and maintained the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii for over 135 years. Their selfless efforts serve as a guiding light for us today.

Our assembly begins on Friday morning with an opening service in the Hondo of Hawaii Betsuin. The recitation of Vandana and Ti-Sarana, followed by sutra chanting, sets the tone for the event. During this service, we honor and remember the dedicated leaders who have passed away since the last assembly. This tradition, maintained for over a century, connects us to the values and legacy of the Nembutsu.

The general assembly follows, with nearly 160 delegates and observers gathering in the social hall to deliberate on

critical issues. Resolutions approved by the majority receive our collective support—both financial and physical—ensuring their successful implementation. In recent years, we've opened the assembly to representatives from affiliated Hongwanji organizations, allowing us to hear their voices and collaborate more effectively. This inclusion strengthens our mission and supports these organizations in their service to the community.

The Legislative Assembly also serves as a reminder of our responsibility to pass on the values of sincerity, compassion, and truth to future generations. As the Buddha taught, "As the light of a small candle will spread from one to another in succession, so the light of Buddha's compassion will pass on from one mind to another endlessly." Through this process, we create a brighter future for the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, ensuring that the teachings of the Nembutsu continue to inspire and guide us.

In the Buddha's teachings, it is said: "The rain of the sacred teaching falls on all people alike without regard to their conditions or circumstances. Those who accept it gather into small groups, then into organizations, into communities, and finally find themselves in the great Ocean of Enlightenment. The minds of these people mix like milk and water and finally organize into a harmonious Brotherhood. Thus, true teaching is the fundamental requirement of a perfect organization, and it is the light that enables people to recognize one another, to become adjusted to one another, and to smooth out the rough places in their thinking."

Let us remember that we are all embraced by the infinite wisdom and compassion of Amida Buddha. May we live each day with gratitude for this boundless guidance.

PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT Cyber Crime Alert

Our temple community has recently been targeted by another wave of cybercrime attempts, and we want to ensure everyone stays informed and vigilant. Fraudulent emails posing as trusted individuals, such as Rev. Murakami, have been reported, again.

These emails typically:

- Use a fake sender address like rev.reverend@keemail.me.
- Request gift cards or money for urgent or confidential matters, such as "surprising temple members with a gift."
- Warn recipients not to contact Rev. Murakami directly and insist on communicating only via email.

What You Need to Know:

- Rev. Murakami will never ask for gift cards or monetary donations through email.
- These emails are scams designed to exploit trust and generosity within our community, particularly during times of heightened need.
- The official email of Rev. Murakami has not been compromised; the scammers are using a fake address to impersonate him.

What You Should Do:

- 1. Do not respond to suspicious emails or click on any links.
- 2. Verify the email's authenticity by calling the temple office directly.
- 3. Report the email to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center at IC3.gov.
 - Filing a report is straightforward; provide details of the email and any attachments.
 - Your report helps authorities track these scams and build cases against the perpetrators.

Why Reporting Matters:

Scammers often target elderly individuals in the community, knowing they are more likely to trust such emails. Reporting cybercrimes involving victims over 70 can result in higher penalties for offenders, making your actions even more impactful.

By staying alert and reporting suspicious activity, we protect not only ourselves but also the broader community. Together, we can help prevent cybercrime and ensure the safety and trust of our temple members.



Buddha Reads: "Endurance: Shackleton's Incredible Voyage" by Alfred Lansing Danny Topp



Our recent book discussion group, featuring Dan, Mary, Bob, and Joan, explored Endurance: Shackleton's Incredible Voyage by Alfred Lansing. This gripping account chronicles Sir Ernest Shackleton's 1914–1917 Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition, which turned into an extraordinary story of survival. Drawing extensively from the diaries and firsthand accounts of the crew, Lansing weaves a vivid narrative of their harrowing ordeal. Everyone in the group thoroughly enjoyed the book and highly recommends it.

Joan and Bob praised the book's compelling narrative. Joan shared that she couldn't put it down, marveling at the vivid descriptions of the crew's endurance. The group re-

flected on the monumental challenges Shackleton's men faced: navigating icy waters with primitive tools, surviving 387 days stranded on the ice, and enduring some of the harshest conditions on Earth—all without a single fatality. The crew's resilience and ability to overcome seemingly insurmountable odds resonated deeply with everyone.

Bob highlighted Shackleton's remarkable leadership, particularly his strategic approach to maintaining harmony within the group. One standout example was Shackleton's thoughtful organization of tent assignments, pairing personalities to foster teamwork and prevent discord. His adaptability, decisive leadership, and unwavering commitment to his crew's welfare became central themes in the discussion.

The group also delved into the psychological aspects of the expedition. Mary admired the crew's perseverance, noting how they overcame exhaustion, hunger, and isolation. Dan offered an intriguing perspective, suggesting that people in the early 20th century may have had a different mindset, better equipping them to endure extreme hardships. This sparked a broader discussion about how modern individuals can draw inspiration from Shackleton's story to tackle today's challenges.

The group agreed that Shackleton's journey offers timeless lessons on leadership, perseverance, and teamwork. His ability to adapt plans, prioritize his team's well-being, and inspire hope under immense pressure serves as a powerful reminder of the human capacity for resilience. These lessons, the group noted, are particularly relevant in today's uncertain times.

We will meet again on Sunday, February 2nd, via Zoom to discuss our next book, Secret Harvests: A Hidden Story of Separation and the Resilience of a Family Farm.

Lele Aloha donates \$240,000 to 14 Lahaina Spiritual Centers

The Lele Aloha nonprofit organization has awarded a total of \$240,000 to 14 Lahaina spiritual centers, a contribution that aims to support the restoration and rebuilding efforts of those community hubs and places of worship.

The spiritual centers receiving the donations include Moku'ula, Waiola Church, Lahaina Baptist Church, Lahaina Hongwanji Mission, International Christian Fellowship Church of God and Lahaina Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Additionally, Maria Lanakila Catholic Church, Lahaina Shingon Mission, Holy Innocents Episcopal Church, The Wo Hing Temple Museum, Lahaina United Methodist Church, Lahaina Jodo Mission, Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses and Grace Baptist Church are also receiving support through Lele Aloha.

"The spiritual centers of Lahaina are not just places of worship, but

also vital community gathering spaces," said Archie Kalepa, founder of Lele Aloha, in a news release announcing the donation. "It is our hope that these funds will help restore their presence and bring healing and hope to the people of Lahaina."

The word Eitaikyo means "perpetual sutra." Eitai means "perpetual" and kyo means "sutra," or "teaching of Buddha." The term "Eitaikyo" is defined as a "perpetual memorial service."

They established the Eitaikyo fund, a separate fund from the temple's other funds, set aside for use by the temple in extraordinary circumstances or emergencies. 2025 Membership Dues Being Collected

Have you noticed? When we send reminders about gojikai, we often use the term "membership dues." In Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, gojikai refers to contributions that support the temple. While both terms are interchangeable, younger members typically say "membership dues" or just "dues."

Each January, we remind members to renew their dues for the year. These contributions are essential for funding religious services, educational programs, community events, and maintaining temple facilities. A portion is also sent to Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii to cover our temple's assessment, which in 2024 totaled \$37,713—or \$153.30 per member (family).

Suggested Dues: To help members decide their contributions, the board offers these guidelines:

- Households with two or more members: \$20–\$30 per month.
- Single-member households: \$12–\$15 per month.


Members are encouraged to contribute an amount that fits their financial ability. No one will be excluded from membership based on their dues.
