

TEACHINGS FROM THE MINISTER

Joy and Dedication

Dear Wailuku Hongwanji members and families, heard the good news that the Maui Fair will return this year on the first weekend of October! Unfortunately, we will not be participating in the Chow Fun booth fundraising this time. However, I fondly remember the many games, rides, and delicious foods at the fairgrounds. The Maui Fair is truly one of the most significant events for the people of Maui. Many local organizations rely on it as a major fundraiser. For children and young people, it is a source of joy and excitement: four days filled with fun and cherished memories here on our island.

Αt the fair. many organizations run booths. including groups we recognize from our daily activities and community events. People work together as a team to accomplish their fundraising goals. But beyond that, see something even more meaningful: through working together, they create joy and lasting friendships.

When I used to help at the Chow Fun booth, I found it interesting that even if we didn't know each other, conversations would naturally flow about the economy, sports, politics, and daily life. Interestingly, we rarely talked about religion (it seems people aren't too interested in that during the fair!). But everyone was open-minded, and we shared a lot of laughter.

Many newcomers, especially parents of

preschool children. often don't know I'm a minister. They speak in strong local dialects, using expressions I sometimes don't understand, including frequent use of "F-words" as part of their natural way of communicating. Then someone would say, "Eh, watch what you say, we get one minister here!" That always made everyone laugh and deepened our sense of togetherness.

It's true, when we talk about topics we care about, we can engage for hours, sharing thoughts, building understanding, and forming friendships. new ı was always impressed by how informed many people were. Sometimes, I told myself that they should run for County or State office, because their comments were so insightful!

In the teachings of the Buddha, there is a passage I always respect and aspire to follow:

"It is a very good deed to cast away greed and to cherish a mind of charity. It is still better to keep one's mind intent on respecting the Noble Path."

We are encouraged to let go of selfishness and cultivate a sincere heart dedicated to helping others. One act of kindness inspire can another, and from that. happiness is born.

Another passage from the Buddha teaches:

Reverend Shinkai Murakami

"Thousands of candles can be lit from a single candle, and the life of the candle will not be shortened. Happiness never decreases by being shared."

As you may know, our lives are always interconnected. Through sincere offerings and sharing, we can discover true joy and happiness and pass along these wonderful legacies of dedication to the people around us.

Wailuku Hongwanji Mission is truly a place where we can learn and share this important guidance through temple services, member support, volunteer activities, and educational workshops.



Buddha Reads "James: Percival Everett's Reimagining..."

Our latest Buddha Reads Book Club gathered Bob, Joan, Gary, Laura, Farron, and Danny for a lively discussion of James by Percival Everett, a reimagining of The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn told through Jim's perspective. In this retelling, Jim is portrayed as intelligent and resourceful, with his hopes and fears at the center of the story. While much of Twain's plot remains, the novel diverges in the final third, moving the timeline to the Civil War and offering a new ending.

Discussion ranged from the novel's pacing, satire, and historical context to critiques of style and character portrayals. Members compared James to works like Uncle Tom's Cabin and 12 Years a Slave, reflecting on the importance of context when reading stories about slavery. Most recommended the book, though a few noted it might resonate more if paired with Twain's original.

The group will meet again on Sunday, September 14, to discuss Homegoing by Yaa Gyasi.

Maui Wildfires Special Memorial Service Was Held at Wailuku Hongwanji Buddhist Temple



On Sunday, August 10, Wailuku Hongwanji hosted a special Maui Wildfire Memorial and Recovery Service. The heartfelt gathering brought together ministers, members, guests, and community leaders in a spirit of compassion, remembrance, and healing. We were honored to welcome Maui County Mayor Richard Bissen, Senator Troy Hashimoto, and Councilmember Yuki Lei Sugimura, along with Richard Carosso, Principal of Lahainaluna High School, who delivered the keynote message. His words centered on healing, unity, and the enduring strength of Lahaina, a testament to leadership grounded in empathy and hope. Mayor Bissen shared reflections on the resilience of residents in Lahaina, Kula, and across Maui, affirming that these communities grow stronger as they face and overcome tragedy. Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani offered spiritual guidance, inviting all to reflect on the Buddhist teachings of interconnectedness and shared humanity. "Recovery begins not just with rebuilding homes, but with reconnecting hearts," he reminded us.

This memorial service was originally proposed by the Buddhist Women's Federation of Japan at its 17th World Convention in Kyoto. The Federation wished their donation to provide comfort and solidarity to those affected by the wildfires, sending the message: "Our hearts and minds are with you." The service stood as a reminder of compassion, strength, and hope, guiding us as we walk the path of recovery together.
