

#### **TEACHINGS FROM THE MINISTER**

### **Spiritual Home**

Namo Amida Butsu

I would like to sincerely thank everyone for making the Wailuku Hongwanji Buddhist Women's Association's (BWA) 120th Anniversary Memorial Service on September 21st and the BWA Craft Sale on October 18 a great success. I deeply appreciate your warm understanding, cooperation, and support. Seeing everyone's smiles reminds me that the temple is truly a wonderful place, a place of gratitude and joy where the smiles of many can be seen.

During Sunday services, I often say, "The temple is our spiritual home" and use various metaphors to express that "The temple is a place where we all share joy."

The other day, I was talking with some members, and since it had been a long time since we last met. I invited them to my office for coffee. One person surprised me by saying, "Sensei, the temple office has always seemed like a place only special people go to. It has nothing to do with people like us who don't do anything." I replied, "Not at all. The temple office is not just for special people, it is a place where everyone in the temple can come freely, talk, and enjoy themselves. There's always coffee, cookies, and souvenirs, so it's a space to relax and chat."

While we were talking, members of the BWA and others from the temple came in, and soon the room was filled with lively conversation. Before leaving, one person said, "Sensei, the temple office is like a coffee shop it was so much fun! I met many people I know. Can I come again?" I smiled and replied, "This is your temple. Please come anytime."

There is a wonderful story about Rennyo Shōnin from about 550 years ago. During time, the Hongwanji grew into a large religious organization, and many people from all over Japan traveled Yamashina Hongwanji Temple in Kyoto to hear the Nembutsu. Since there was modern transportation, people walked many miles to get there. Along the way, they sometimes visited hot springs and sightseeing spots, but records show that Rennyo Shōnin instructed the temple staff:

"If parishioners visit on a hot day, wash their feet and serve them cold sake to soothe their fatigue. If they visit in the cold winter, serve them hot sake to warm their bodies."

The Hongwanji deeply appreciated those who made the long journey and served as a spiritual refuge for its members.

We at Wailuku Hongwanji are also a place of peace, built and nurtured by many great Nembutsu pioneers, a spiritual refuge and home for all of you. I was touched recently when a Dharma School student, who also attends the Japanese

Language School, said to another student: "This is my church. It's a fun place where we play games together. You should come too. We can have fun and enjoy being with friends."





### BWA Recipe of the Week: Layered Manju - Courtesy of Gwen Hiraga



### Ingredients:

2 cups butter 1/2 cup sugar 3/4 cup condensed milk 1/2 teaspoon salt 5 cups flour 1 egg, beaten 1 (21oz) can pie filling (apple, cherry, blueberry) or bean paste

### **Directions:**

Heat oven to 350°F. Lightly spray 9-by-13-inch baking pan. In a large bowl, mix butter and sugar. Add condensed milk and salt. Add flour slowly and mix well. Shape into a ball and cut in half. Place 1/2 of the dough in pan and spread evenly. Top dough with pie or bean paste filling. Top filling with remaining dough, pat gently. Brush egg on top of dough. Bake 40-45 minutes until golden brown. Let it cool completely before cutting. Serves 24.


fantastic time!

### Rev. Tatsuo Muneto; Nov. 9th Eitaikyo Memorial Service Speaker

Wailuku Hongwanji Buddhist Temple warmly welcomes Rev. Tatsuo Muneto as guest speaker for the Eitaikyo Memorial Service on Sunday, Nov. 9, at 9a.m.

Eitaikyo, meaning "perpetual sutra chanting," is a tradition in which sutras are recited in lasting tribute to departed loved ones. Families who enroll names in the Eitaikyo Book ensure that sutras are chanted in their memory for as long as the temple exists. These services, held twice annually, express enduring gratitude and connection.

Rev. Muneto, originally from Hiroshima, joined the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii in 1965 after completing Buddhist studies at Ryukoku University and training in Kyoto. He later earned a master's degree in Asian Studies and Clinical Pastoral Education.

Over his 50-year ministry, he served at temples across Hawai'i, including Hawaii Betsuin, Hilo Betsuin, Kona Hongwanji, Lihue Hongwanji, Moiliili Hongwanji, and the Buddhist Study Center. Though retired since 2014, he continues to support Buddhist education, training, counseling, and hospital chaplaincy.

Rev. Muneto is the author of Dharma Treasures – Spiritual Insights from Hawaii's Shin Buddhist Pioneers (1995), and with his wife Edna, enjoys travel to sacred Buddhist sites. They are proud parents of two daughters and grandparents of two grandsons.

# Honpa Hongwanji Launches New Shining Spirit Award Program for Youth

Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii (HHMH) has announced a new program intended to honor up-and-coming young community leaders for their service and achievements. Emi Hashi, HHMH's Children and Youth Activities Specialist explained, "we are looking for youth, ages 10 to 20 years old with outstanding community service, impact, leadership, and personal growth."

**Purpose -** To recognize youth in Hawaii for their outstanding community service and embodying the spirit of selfless giving. The program's objective is to inspire the next generation to understand and embrace the importance of serving and contributing to the greater good of society

**Eligibility** - Nominees shall meet the following eligibility requirements:

- Age range of 10 to 20 years old
- A legal resident of Hawaii.
- Engaged in contributing activities for at least 12 months prior to the date of application.

**Criteria for Selection** - The following criteria will be used in the selection process:

- Impact on Community: How did the individual impart meaningful change, whether through addressing a community need, improving quality of life, or inspiring others.
- Initiative: How does the individual demonstrate leadership, show creativity in problem-solving or developed new ways to address issues.
- Effort: How does the individual exemplify dedication and resilience, and demonstrate consistent, sustained effort in their projects or causes, even under challenging circumstances.
- Personal Growth: How did the individual gain new skills and confidence, and acquire life lessons that have contributed to their personal development.

**Nomination Procedure -** An organization or person from the community (teacher, advisor, counselor, mentor, clergy, coach, etc.) may nominate a young person for this recognition by submitting the following:

- Nomination form with information on the nominee
- Recommendation letters (maximum of three)

The completed nomination form and letters of recommendation must be received by the HHMH's Living Treasures of Hawaii Committee no later than November 15, 2025. Nomination forms are available at the Wailuku Hongwanji Temple office. Additional program details may be obtained by calling the HHMH's main office at (808) 522-9200.

# Archives Workshop for Beginners, Nov. 16

Archiving: We all know it's important but, without expert guidance, deciding how to go about it can feel like guesswork. That's where an upcoming archives workshop for the Hongwanji community comes in.

On Sunday, November 16, from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m., UH Mānoa Archivist Helen Wong Smith will be the expert speaker at a workshop entitled "Essentials of Managing an Archival Collection" at the Buddhist Study Center and on Zoom. Recently, Wailuku Hongwanji members received scam emails spoofing our minister's address. At that time, we advised reporting such messages to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) at www.ic3.gov. The FBI has now issued a new alert that fake IC3 websites, such as ic3-gov.com and ic3gov.org, are stealing personal and financial information from people trying to file legitimate reports.

To stay safe, always type "www.ic3.gov" directly into your browser, verify the address ends in .gov, and avoid sponsored links in search results. The FBI stresses it will never ask for payment to recover funds and that IC3 has no social media accounts.

This reminder is being shared to help our members stay vigilant. If you encounter scams, suspicious links, or websites impersonating IC3, please report them only through the official FBI IC3 website at www.ic3.gov.
